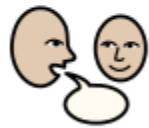

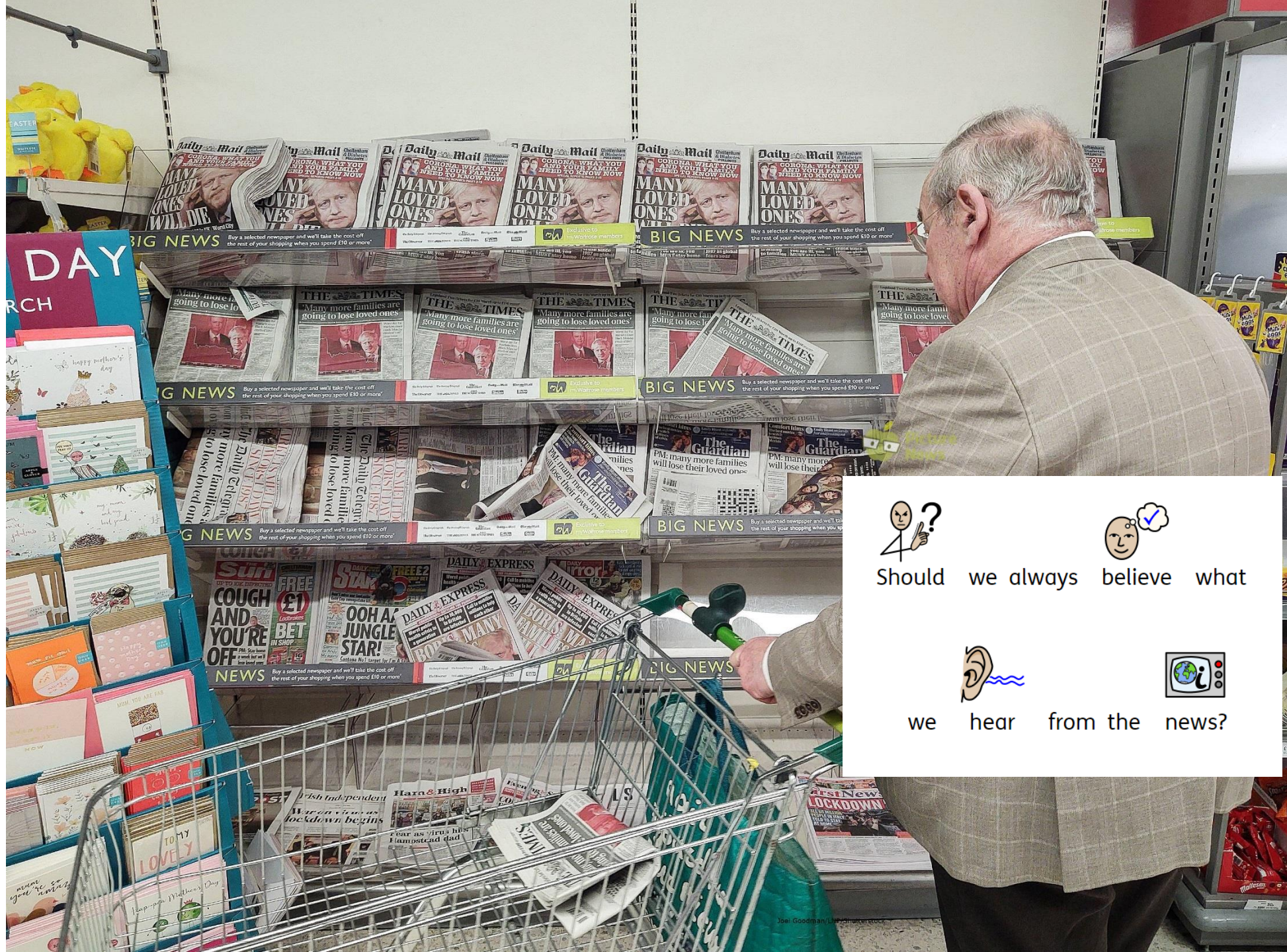

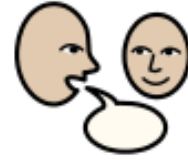
Use the following questions to help you decide if the stories are real or fake:
