This week, why not try to make either a mammal or insect?
You will need:
- Paper (card) - 1 per mammal
- Scissors and glue
- Pencil and marker
- Ink glue and fabric or tissue - eg felt, tissue, paper, cotton, etc.
How to:
Step 1: Before you start, think of the challenge! Cut the top part off the roll of paper. This paper will be used for the body of the mammal or insect.
Step 2: Cut the paper into a shape that will be the body of the mammal or insect.


Start at number 1 reading the time to the hour on a 12 hour clock and make sure you are confident before you move on to number 2, 3, 4, then 5.

If you are confident start again at 1 but this time select the twenty-four-hour clock, look carefully at the options and if the clock says AM or PM.



